GACM Update

The hazy hot days of summer have been anything but lazy for the wonderful Crisis Ministry Food Cupboard volunteers. The hot temperatures have not stopped their service as weekly they go out to pickup donations, stock shelves, pack bags, and setup for outdoor food distribution. In July, despite the heat, we've served over 90 households weekly. These numbers are unusually high for this time of year. As you can imagine, it's been a challenge keeping food on the shelves.

GACM's last day of summer food service is August 8. We will reopen after Labor Day.

FPCG Family, let us celebrate Dani Howard's work promotion after one (1) year and five (5) months ago joining Trickle Up Programs (TU), a nonprofit organization globally dedicated in helping Ultra-Poor Women out of Poverty. She has dedicated her 25+ nonprofit career to helping nonprofit organizations across the country, managing their financial resources. She has finally been recognized in title and compensation for a long earned and well-deserved dedication to nonprofit public service and now the needful global community. Her service dedication includes time working with the Philadelphia Presbytery Stated Clerk, Kevin Porter and administrative assistance to Interim Executive Presbytery Director, Lucy Rupe. She also served as Treasurer on the GACM Board of Directors with Eileen Jones.

Dani Howard was promoted to the role of Senior Director of Global
Finance this passed June. Her position has been expanded to recognize the global
function in the responsibilities this position plays, where Dani provides both oversight and capacity building to
support and supervise internal financial, organizational, accounting activities, and strategic planning across all of
TU. She is in daily contact with the financial and operational staff in our two regional offices navigating

communications within different time zones (India 11.5 hours ahead, and Latin America 2 hours behind EST) as well our scattered USA TU Program Staff with grant reporting. Over this past year, she has worked tirelessly to help automate many of the transactions carried out in our Regional Offices as part of our monthly accounting close and added finance and operational capacity to our Global locations each month as we grow. She has reduced the time for month end closing from 45 days to less than 20 days and eliminated our need for help from a long-lasting relationship with an outside accounting firm.



FPCG Service Learning trip to Puerto Rico













We are mid-way through Freedom School 2024. The children are having a wonderful time learning and having fun. One of many highlights included Science time with Andrea Overton. The lesson was on physics and architecture. The time concluded with scholars' making bridges out of mini marshmallows and toothpicks. Many were quite interesting to look at and a few were structurally sound. Freedom School will end Friday August 9.









PAR- People Advancing Reintegration-Recycle Works

PAR-Recycle Works is a non-profit electronics recycler that provides transitional employment to people returning from prison. PAR received the June Challenge Offering. During July, we collected electronics for them to recycle. Three Freedom School Scholars, Allen Oglesby, David Daniel and Mahkai Hobson delivered the recyclables and toured the PAR facility. They met some of the men and women working there and learned about the steps used to break down the electronics components. One worker told the youth that in prison he earned \$28 a month. At PAR he is paid \$15.50 per hour; money he needs to get back on his feet following incarceration. The scholars were encouraged to be wise in decision making as they gain greater independence in high school so they will never need to participate in the program. An update on our church gymnasium





One can only imagine, that from the beginning when our church built its gymnasium down in the basement, the problem of flooding has plagued that area of our facilities. That wing of our church was built over a creek that flows through our property. Keeping water out of our basement has therefore been an ongoing struggle, which has been and will continue to be

exacerbated due to increased precipitation and rising water tables due to global warming.

A number of years ago, in response to a major flooding that saw our basement under 12 inches of water, our property committee wisely committed to a major renovation by installing a multi stage dewatering pump station that stopped the infiltration of water in the SW corner of our basement. This was done in addition to updating our youth lounge. This renovation has served to stop water from entering the SW corner of our basement. To date we have yet to experience flooding in that

portion of the basement, deeming the project a major success.


Ministries such as our youth groups, our drop-in center, our open gym program, our summer Freedom School as well as our community partners depend upon this space to run programming to our congregation's youth as well as children throughout the NW region of Philadelphia.

This year we were hit with significant spring rains that forced water into the NW corner of the basement. This is not uncommon each spring. It frequently has caused interruptions in our programming due to the gymnasium flooding. This year the problem came to a head as the flooding lasted for almost two weeks straight. The water spread to the entire north (Vernon Park) and east walls (small parking lot) of the gym causing the entire gym to become completely unusable. Our property committee, seeing the need, has responded by creating a plan with

engineers and contractors to protect the remaining vulnerable area of the basement. By establishing an interlinking system of French (trench) Drains throughout the basement and water pumps to remove water from those drains, the entire basement area would be fully protected from future flooding.

This is truly a legacy project as it will finally solve a problem that generations before us grappled with, and that has plagued our present ministries.

As with any larger project, funding is a major hurdle to overcome. In the coming months, more information will be shared with our congregation about the steps this project will undergo, and we as a congregation will be invited to join the effort by our giving. We will be given the opportunity to be a part of an effort that will keep our basement and gymnasium open to be used to minister for generations to come. Please pray for this effort and when the time comes, consider giving generously.
